TEXT 1: COW HUGGING: A NEW WELLNESS TREND

- Embracing cows is more than a cute wellness trend. With immense mental health benefits, the practice has aroused global interest.
- From goat yoga to sound baths, the world is full of wellness trends designed to relieve and calm both body and spirit. Named “koe knuffelen” in Dutch (literally “cow hugging”), the practice is centred on the healing properties of a good human-to-animal physical contact. Cow huggers typically start by taking a tour of the farm before resting against one of the cows for two to three hours. The cow’s warmer body temperature, slower heartbeat and giant size can make hugging them an incredibly satisfying experience, and giving the animal a backrub, reclining against them or even getting licked is all part of the therapeutic encounter.
- Cow hugging is believed to promote positivity and reduce stress by boosting oxytocin in humans, the hormone released in social bonding. The calming effects of resting with a pet or emotional support animal, it seems, are accentuated when hugging larger mammals.
- This healthy pastime emerged in rural Dutch provinces more than a decade ago and is now part of a wider Dutch movement to bring people closer to nature and country life. Today, farms in Rotterdam, Switzerland, and even the USA are offering cow-hugging sessions and promoting their healing properties.
- The hugging experience can even be pleasurable for the cattle themselves. A 2007 study in a scientific journal states that cows show traces of deep relaxation, stretching out, and allowing their ears to fall back when massaged in particular areas of their neck and upper back.
- It seems that heartfelt bonding with bovines may just be what should be advised by doctors.

3 biggest adjustment challenges has been related to school. There are many new rules and rituals, considerably more than she had
4 experienced in the United States. For example, in Japan she must wear a uniform, while in the US she did not. At her Japanese school,
5 they not only wear the same uniform, but also all students of a certain grade level wear the same indoor shoes. Her classmates seem
6 to like wearing identical clothes, but Sarah feels like she has lost a significant portion of her ability to express herself.
7 Another challenge for Sarah is the fact that, every day after school, all students work together to clean up their classroom and the
8 school hallways. Sarah doesn't generally mind cleaning, but it is the last thing she wants to do after a long day at school, and she
9 frequently gets frustrated and upset by the additional activity. Finally, the school year began with a one-hour ceremony. While Sarah
10 had gotten bored and tired of standing so long, her classmates seemed to really enjoy the event.
11 What is going on? Why do people from other cultures behave and think differently? According to Professor Hofstede's "Cultural
12 Dimensions Theory," discrepancies in behavior can be explained by cultural differences, taking into account that "national culture
13 cannot be changed, but you should understand and respect it."
